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DLR'S Day At Thorpe Park

Since after having me write her newsletter entry last week, Ms Gunning has clearly discovered the joy of outsourcing. Because of this, she's asked me to do a "review" of our class's trip to Thorpe Park last Monday on her behalf.

Unfortunately for her though, I had never visited anywhere like Thorpe park before and nor had I been on a roller coaster until this week either. As a result of this, I have no prior experience with which to compare our time at this amusement park to. Previously unbeknownst to me, it turned out that it is home to what are officially some of the most famous and exciting park attractions and rides in the world. To my surprise, many people I've spoken to since are extremely familiar with the rides and even their names along with those of other parks. Apparently then, there's a lot I've been missing out on.

Shortly after arriving at Thorpe, I was pressured into joining my tutors and fellow classmates on Storm Surge. Whilst it wasn't a roller coaster, I was very much reluctant to go on this water ride. Admittedly though, it wasn't nearly as terrifying as I feared it to be and we didn't actually get completely drenched by the splashes, sprinklers and geysers. It was more of a large twisty slide-like thing where the occupants of the small boats merely get mildly dizzy on their descent as opposed to some terrible watery widowmaker.

Afterwards, the entire class seemingly decided that their clothes were nowhere near soaked enough for their satisfaction. This was indicated by their decision to go on the Tidal Wave, which once held the title of "tallest water ride in Europe". I insisted on assigning myself the role of "designated survivor" and sat this one out. Given how soggy everyone else's trousers were after returning from Tidal Wave, I don't regret doing so either.

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In fact, I chose not to join the class on any roller coasters or larger rides until later in the day, when Ms Gunning, Mr Ali and my peers said they wished to try going on Stealth again. Under the impression that Stealth lay more towards the tamer side of attractions, I begrudgingly agreed after much persuasion to join them. As we neared closer to it however, I realised just how insanely brutal it actually was upon seeing myself for the first time; after the first 90-degree turn, we'd be over 200 feet off the ground, we'd also be propelled to 80 MPH in just 1.9 seconds — considerably faster than an F1 car. This then was the second tallest roller coaster in the UK and the third-fastest accelerating on earth, and I had now been compelled to ride it. I, a complete newbie to roller coasters, would be strapped into that. As you can imagine then, I was trembling with "confidence".

To add to the enormous sense of comfort and security I felt over this petrifying 4.8 G-force experience, I'd have to endure it without my glasses. This meant I was about to do one of the scariest things imaginable but while as blind as a bat. Thankfully, I would at least have Ms Gunning next to me; as we were harnessed in, she made it clear that it would all be over quite quickly. At this point I wasn't actually even sure if she was referring to the amount of time spent on Stealth or the remainder of our existence. I wrongly assumed the latter, but can be forgiven for doing so given what happened next.

Before we knew it, we were hurled practically vertically up towards Stealth's highest point. "Insanity" is the only word I can use to describe the entire sensation, but this is largely because after just a few seconds from the launch, I had passed out. Genuinely. I can't recall precisely when or where this happened or for how long, but according to Ms Gunning, she saw my head slump forwards and my eyes suddenly shut. My shoulder pain for the next day or so made me understand why you're meant to keep your head upright and back on the ride, but I began to regain consciousness moments later, and the whole thing was over as quickly as it had begun. Somewhat disorientated, I followed Ms Gunning back to my classmates who'd been on the rollercoaster just before us, and was met with a combination of concern and laughter upon them learning of me having

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After having the opportunity to sit down for a couple of minutes and have a drink, I immediately convinced Ms Gunning that rather than queue up for Stealth again, we should instead get in line for the teacups ride. So, with me, her and a couple other sixth formers crammed into one spinning cup, we braced ourselves for what was a slightly milder experience than that of Stealth, but by far the most enjoyable of that day's. It was whilst swirling around in that teacup on that afternoon, that I realised just why people rave on about places like this. I had won a soft toy from the hook-a-duck stall that day, but I'd also be taking home the memories which would last a lifetime and that I can look back on whenever I wish to remind myself of just how enjoyable life can be whenever things get a little challenging.


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Designated Team For Child Protection And Safeguarding
